1717 Meetinghouse Foundation ~ Steve Musselman, Trustee

At its recent Annual Meeting, the 1717 Meetinghouse Foundation's President Georgia Lonkart outlined the recent completed projects.

The major projects accomplished since the last Annual Meeting include: Air Conditioning the Meetinghouse (and increasing electrical service), Landscaping and Driveway hardscaping with drainage repair and wiring, and of course the Bell Tower Rebuild. Costs just this year for those projects exceeded \$300,000.

And of course, the recent live streaming of the WBCA Meet the Candidates Night was made possible by an updated pan/tilt/zoom IP camera system.

These projects were made possible largely by the generous bequests from friends of the 1717 Meetinghouse


Foundation. Such bequests were given in part by Marjorie and Donald Carey, former Trustee John Palmer Jenkins and a memorial gift honoring John Lahteine, Restoration Master Craftsman and woodworker.

Georgia Lonkart explained that over a decade ago, the Board of Trustees had conducted an extensive Needs Assessment list for the Meetinghouse. Ten years later "we have now completed the major projects list."

Maintenance is ongoing and work on the outside lighting is still needed. New needs are always being identified in such a 300-year old Historic village icon. The funding of the work to preserve the 1717 Meetinghouse falls exclusively on the generous donations - past and future - from friends in our community.

Leaders of the American Revolution from West Barnstable

You'll be hearing more and more about the American Revolution over the next two years as we approach the 250th anniversary of the founding of the United States of America. Did you know that the Otis family of West Barnstable played key roles in fighting for our independence? James Otis, Jr. is thought by many to have incited the revolt against England's tyranny.

James' father, James Otis, Sr., was a merchant, a lawyer, and the Chief Justice of Barnstable's Court of Common Pleas. The Otis family's home was across the street from where our West Barnstable Post Office now stands. Sadly the Otis house burned down around 1830. A plaque mounted on a boulder marks the site

James, Jr. graduated from Harvard in 1743 with a law degree. By 1760 he was defending those who were fighting unfair searches (writs of assistance) and taxation by England's Parliament. In February of 1761 Otis gave a commanding speech of over four hours at the State House in Boston. A young law student and future American President, John Adams, was there that day. "Otis was a flame of fire!" he noted, "American independence was then and there born."


James continued to work for the rights of the Colonies into the early 1770s. He argued that the colonists should not have to pay taxes and tariffs to support the government of England, because the Colonies were not represented in England's House of Commons. The Stamp Act of 1765 forced the purchase of a stamp for all documents, newspapers, even playing cards. British officers had the right to search homes for proper use of the stamps - without a search warrant! He is credited by many for getting the Stamp Act rescinded a year later.

James Otis, Jr. dealt with fragile mental health. His condition wasn't helped by a blow to the head during a fight with a British soldier in 1769. He eventually needed the aid of family and friends. He is reported to have said to his sister, Mercy, "I hope, when God Almighty in his righteous providence shall take me out of time into eternity, that it will be by a flash of lightning." On May 23, 1783, he was standing in an open door of a farmhouse in Andover, MA when he was struck and killed by lightning.
