Welcome Spring! The West Barnstable Community embraced a spring day with a fantastic Spaghetti Supper on April 1st at the West Barnstable Fire Station. Many volunteers and the West Barnstable Fire Department staff collaborated on this gathering that radiated community spirit after a rainy morning changed to a cloudy day just in time for dinner. Funds were

raised to support the West Barnstable Village Festival this coming August 19th.

The Town is looking for new potential sources for municipal water. Some areas in West Barnstable which are on property owned by the Town are among the seven sites being evaluated by contractors for the Town of Barnstable. The public is always welcome to attend the meetings held at the West Barnstable Community Building at 6:30 PM. The next meeting will be held on Monday, June 5th. The Prudential Committee meets on the third Wednesday of each month at the West Barnstable Fire Station at 4 PM. Their next scheduled meeting is May 17th. The public is invited to attend.

West Barnstable Historical Society ~ Nancy Viall Shoemaker

Revolutionary War Soldier Lt. Lemuel Snow

WBHS and the 1717 Meetinghouse Foundation are hosting a lecture on a Barnstable patriot that few of us knew about, Lt. Lemuel Snow. The presentation will be at the Meetinghouse May 19th at 7 PM.

In June of 1776, 17-year-old Lemuel Snow of West Barnstable borrowed a musket and went off to fight in the Revolutionary War. He served for eight years, from Peekskill to Saratoga, Valley Forge to Providence. Snow became a lieutenant, witnessed the execution of John André, and was a member of the



Society of the Cincinnati. After the war he returned to West Barnstable for nearly 30 years, where he worked as a farmer and shipbuilder before settling with his family in what is today Indiana.

Join historian and Snow's descendant Kirk Moldoff for a look at the Revolutionary War and post-war life in Barnstable through one local soldier's experiences. The event is free, but donations are much appreciated.

The Cooperative Bank of Cape Cod ~ Are Your Bank Accounts Fully Insured? What You Need to Know about Deposit Insurance

Most of us don't spend much time worrying about how safe our money is in the bank. And we shouldn't. However, during these uncertain economic times, it is more important than ever to be aware of a few nuances to ensure your bank is fully safeguarding your deposits.

FDIC Insurance is the first step.

The FDIC insures all deposits up to \$250,000 per depositor, and most banks are FDIC insured. So, in the unlikely event that your bank failed or there was a bank run, you'd be covered for up to \$250,000 of your savings, checking and money market account; certificates of deposit; and retirement accounts.

But what if you have more than \$250,000 in deposits? What happens then?

Enter the Depositors Insurance Fund (DIF).

The DIF is a private, Massachusetts-based fund that covers savings and mutual banks. It fills the gap that the FDIC leaves behind. The DIF insures all deposits above the FDIC limits, meaning your money is one hundred percent safe, one hundred percent of the time. This applies to personal, business, nonprofit and government accounts.

All banks that are members of the DIF are also members of the FDIC. But the reverse is not true. Most member banks display DIF signs on doors and at teller stations and

note their membership in advertisements and marketing brochures. Look for "Member FDIC / Member DIF". Or simply ask a customer service representative. The Coop is a member of the FDIC and DIF.

So, you checked and your bank provides DIF, what next?

Absolutely nothing, there are no forms, no paperwork, no special fees. Your coverage begins the moment you open a deposit account. If your bank does not offer DIF, it is likely time to re-evaluate your relationship with the institution.

Peace of Mind

Again, when you deposit money in the bank, you shouldn't have to worry about whether it will be there when you need it. Taking the small step to make sure your institution provides DIF coverage provides the peace of mind you deserve. And considering that no depositor has ever lost a penny in a bank insured by both the FDIC and DIF, that's peace of mind you can take to the bank!

1717 Meetinghouse Foundation ~ Steve Musselman, Trustee



There's been a flurry of activity at the Meetinghouse. Several queued-up projects delayed due to COVID, and now that the pandemic has eased, it's time to get these pent-up projects started. The Foundation is pleased to report to our community that several projects are now complete, or about to be completed:

- *Phase One of handicap access, paving and hardscape improvements
- *Bell Tower restoration to address 70 years of weather-influenced dry rot. The accompanying photo shows the extensive dry-rot that was hiding behind the Cupola under-ceiling.
- *While scaffolding was in place, the Bell Tower was thoroughly repainted.
- *Air Conditioning of the first floor of the Meetinghouse
- *Phase Two of entrance hardscaping and paving

These investments are critical to preserve this historic jewel of our community, and to encourage broader community access. The 1717 Meetinghouse Foundation was established 71 years ago as an independent and sole steward of the Meetinghouse restoration and maintenance. It is through community participation, membership, donations, and bequests to the Foundation that these efforts of historic preservation are funded.

And now we plan on summer programs - including Hyannis Sound in early July - to be enjoyed in air-conditioned comfort.


